Mindfulness and Movement (ONSITE OR ONLINE)

Participants will practice the fundamentals of mindfulness meditation and simple movement to improve mental and physical health. Study group activity will include movements sitting, standing, and walking. Modifications are offered so everyone can participate.

The 1001 Sides of Apeirogon

Helen Kolsky (helen.kolsky@gmail.com)

An apeirogon is a polygon of infinite yet countable sides. This is an apt metaphor for McCann's brilliant novel and for the Israeli-Palestinian conflict which is central to it. The grief of two fathers, each from a different side of the conflict and who has each lost a daughter to the conflict, anchors the narrative.

The novel is structured around 1,001 'chapters,' passages of varying lengths as short as one sentence. These passages interrupt the narrative with unexpected juxtapositions of seemingly unrelated material while the reader is being lured into what McCann refers to as 'radical empathy' with the two fathers (who are real people, by the way). In this study group, we will explore the many facets of this unconventional and beautiful work through guided discussions with members' input. Adequate preparation to participate fully will require 2-3 hours per week plus time to read the novel before the first class.

Readings: *Apeirogon,* Colum McCann, \$18.00 paperback from Penguin Random House, less from other sources.

and Mac computers, or the editing capabilities of an iPhone or Android phone. If the class is interested, we will move on to Adobe Lightroom.

There's a short reading assignment before the first session, and you'll have a photo assignment for the sessions 2 through 6. Assignments will cover a variety of photo types – portrait, landscape, architecture, close-up/macro, flash, and possibly panoramas and high dynamic range (HDR), depending on your camera's functions.

Shakespeare on Love: the tragedy of Romeo and Juliet and the comedy of A Midsummer Night's Dream

We will view "Shakespeare on Love" by immersing ourselves in *Romeo and Juliet*, tragedy, and *A Midsummers Night's Dream*, comedy. Perhaps the most performed of Shakespeare plays, they were written within the same year (1596). They both deal with young people in love defying the wishes and authority of their elders, and provide us with conflicting views about the nature of love — its "ingredients," its constancy, changeability, wonders, and perils. In class we will read scenes aloud, discuss the plays, and watch film clips. Preparation: about two hours per week of reading.

Readings: Any editions of the two plays with explanatory notes. Around \$30 new, \$20 used.

Judaism Meets the Law

This study group considers legal issues, past and current, involving Judaism, religious freedom, and the separation of church and state. We'll discuss issues arising over Jewish practices, court decisions involving Jews and Judaism, especially by the Supreme Court, Jewish Supreme Court justices, controversies over their appointment and the effect of their religion or ethnicity on their decisions, why so many Jews become lawyers, and other issues that interest the class. We won't avoid controversy, such as whether there is anti-Semitism among legislators. I'll aim for a balance of lecture and discussion.

Reading: Optional reading will be emailed.

Making Decisions for the End of Life

As we age, inevitably we have concerns about our final years. How much agency do we wish to retain? What role should family play? What control do we want caregivers to have? Where would we like to be living? This study group will cover legal preparation, residential choices, family involvement, arrangements for terminal illness and dementia, and medical care settings like palliative care or hospice. Each session will be a combination of lecture and class discussion. About an hour a week of preparation time.

A new generation is insisting, in poetry of startling power and beauty, that their culture and history be recognized. We will read work by such major Native American poets as Joy Harjo, current U.S. Poet Laureate, Layli Long Soldier, and Natalie Diaz (2018 Pulitzer-Prize winner and MacArthur Fellow), appreciating how, in poetry, these poets struggle to be recognized both as members of their tribal nations and as Americans, how, in poetry, they find a space for affirmation.

Preparation: 1.5 hours.

Reading: All course materials will be provided by the Study Group Leader. Participants must have access to the internet.

Democracy Is on the November Ballot

Will voters support democracy and stop the authoritarian trend before the 2024 presidential election? This study group will examine the dominant issues of the midterm elections: the consequences of the Supreme Court decisions, the impact of the Jan. 6 investigation, the 2020 census and gerrymandering, the economy and inflation, the Biden administration – successful or not, projected membership of the House and the Senate, and, finally, the election results. The study group format will include discussion and analysis of current news from varied sources.

Reading: Primary sources will be from *The Atlantic, New York Times, Washington Post*, and suggestions by class members. Readings will be distributed in class or by email. Computer access required.



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Afternoon Study Groups

A Survey of Soviet-Jewish History

Joshua Rubenstein (rubenstein.joshua@gmail.com)

Under Bolshevik rule in the Soviet Union from 1917 to the Second World War, Jews, most notably Leon Trotsky, helped to lead the Soviet government while others assumed important roles in culture and industry. During World War II, the occupying Germans

murdered as many as 2.5 million Jews. After the war, Stalin turned on the Jews, suspicious of their enthusiasm for Israel. The Six-Day War in 1967 provoked such a surge of Jewish national feeling that hundreds of thousands of Soviet Jews demanded to leave for Israel. We will discuss the life of Leon Trotsky; the career of the writer Ilya Ehrenburg; the Holocaust in German-occupied Soviet territory; the Jewish Emigration Movement and Russian Jews today.

Reading: Leon Trotsky: A Revolutionary's Life, \$16 paperback; Tangled Loyalties: The Life and Times of Ilya Ehrenburg, \$5 — both by Joshua Rubenstein. Other material will be made available via photocopies, along with a bibliography for the participants' own enrichment. Regarding my book, Tangled Loyalties, I have a large number of copies, both hardcover and paperback. I would be happy to offer copies to participants for the nominal fee of \$5.



Amend: The Fight for America (Netflix) Episode 1

What is the ongoing significance of the 14th Amendment? This is the first in this made-fortelevision series and tells the story of the adoption of the 14th Amendment and the subsequent struggle to live up to the promise of its words. The heart of the 14th Amendment is the definition of citizenship. All citizens have rights and the protection of the law. Prior to the adoption of the 14th Amendment, only White men had any rights.

Jordan Berg Powers (he/him) has served as Executive Director of MassAlliance for over a decade. He has helped elect new progressive leaders across the state, recruited progressive champions to run, and trained hundreds of grassroots organizers. Using his expertise in talking to ordinary voters about progressive policy, Jordan is active in campaigns for saving public education, environmental justice, and a more progressive tax system for the Commonwealth. He

conducts training across the state on understanding government, advocating, grassroots campaigning, messaging, and political power. In 2015 Jordan was recognized for his exceptional work in politics as an inaugural inductee into the 40 Under 40 Poly Award.


In his free time, Jordan serves on the boards of JOIN for Justice, MassBudget, and the Jewish Liberation Fund. He is on the advisory committee for the Jewish Alliance for Law and Social Action (JALSA). In 2018 Jordan was honored to be a part of the JewV'Nation Fellowship—a leadership development program for visionary Jewish leaders across North America. This nine-month fellowship supports 10-16 Jewish leaders ages 18 to 118 through professional/leadership development, networking opportunities, and training aimed at expanding the field of Jewish leaders. Jordan has a Masters in International Politics from the London School of Oriental & African Studies as well as a B.A. in International Development and a B.A. in Economics from American University.

"The freedom to vote is affected by a wide array of laws and court rulings – some lesser known than others.

This overview of federal legislation and Supreme Court rulings will shed light on how we got here, recent developments at the Supreme Court, and current efforts to pass national election standards and combat state attacks on our freedom to vote."

Karen Levit (she/her) serves as National Civil Rights Counsel for the ADL (Anti-Defamation League). She advocates on a range of civil rights issues including voting rights, immigrant and refugee rights, and LGBTQ+ rights, and advises ADL's regional, state, and federal engagement on civil rights issues. Previously, she represented young people in Family Court proceedings as a staff attorney with the Legal Aid Society of New York. She has published work in *Above the Law* and *The Guardian*, the quarterly law journal of the National Association of Counsel for Children. Karen earned her J.D. from the University of Pennsylvania Carey Law School. She earned her B.A. from the City College of New York magna cum laude, where she was elected to Phi Beta Kappa.

Glimpses of the new, still-radical Impressionist style inspired American artists who traveled to Giverny and home again for four decades at the turn of the 20th century, transforming the American art scene. Fall Study Group Leaders



Carol Agate (Judaism and the Law) I practiced law in California and served on the ACLU Los Angeles Chapter advisory board. She worked in both criminal and civil law, and later served as an administrative law judge. One First Amendment case went to the Supreme Court.



Peter Goldberg (Making Decisions at the End of Life) was a practicing dentist in Brookline who saw many hospitalized patients. He has been a hospice volunteer for over five years at Hebrew Senior Life Hospice at Newbridge. These experiences, as well as those with family members, have convinced him of how important it is to make explicit choices.



Judy Herman (Native American Poets) has a doctorate in English and American literature and has taught in universities in the United States and France. Her poems have been published widely. She has taught 3 study groups for TILLI, with a focus on poetry.

Ruth Klepper (Democracy Is on the November Ballot) holds a BA from New York University and did graduate study in education at University at Albany. She was a Planned Parenthood executive director, a candidate for NYS Senate, and a lobbyist for Interfaith Impact of NYS. She is a 14-year docent at the JFK Library. She has led TILLI study groups on politics, philosophy, memoir writing, and the media. She is a former TILLI co-chair.



Helen Kolsky (*The 1001 Sides of Apeirogon*) received a B.A. in English and American Literature from Brandeis University and an M.A. in Communications from The New School University. She taught English at the secondary and college level. This is her second TILLI study group to focus on Palestinian voices. She and Ted Greenwood taught a class on this topic in the TI Center for Adult Jewish Learning (CAJL) this past fall.



Joshua Rubenstein (Soviet-Jewish History) is the author or editor of a number of books on Soviet and Soviet-Jewish history. He has been professionally involved with human rights and international affairs for over forty years at Amnesty International and has been an Associate at Harvard's Davis Center for Russian and Eurasian Studies since 1984.



Michael Sandman (Improving Your Photography) has taught photography classes for TILLI and for Brandeis's BOLLI program. He has won numerous Boston Camera Club awards and his photographs have been widely featured.



Susan Sachs (*Mindfulness and Movement*) has practiced dance, movement, yoga and pilates for many years.
