Participants should bring a notebook and their favorite writing implement to all classes. Although no outside reading or writing will be assigned, study group members may want to prepare by reflecting upon what they might like to write and for whom. Participants may discuss a favorite memoir that has inspired them and given them goals for writing about their own lives.

Morning Study Groups

The Ordeal of Japanese Americans during WWII

Serena Fujita (sfujita@bucknell.edu)

To this day, very few people on the East Coast know about the unjust treatment of Japanese Americans on the West Coast during WWII. This study group will cover Japanese immigration to the United States; Pearl Harbor and the creation of the internment camps; Supreme Court involvement; military enlistment; and, finally, the experience of returning home. We will look in depth at why FDR was pushed into ordering the removal of the Japanese from the West Coast, the terrible treatment of the Japanese Americans in the camps, and the divisions among the Japanese Americans themselves. We will also look at the two Supreme Court cases (Hirabayashi and Korematsu) fighting against the internment of American citizens.

Reading: Robert Reeves, *Infamy: The Shocking Story of the Japanese American Internment in World War II*, (Picador, 2015), \$19 online. The class format will have some lecture components, but discussion will be highly encouraged.

Preparation: 1-2 hours per week.

The Hearing Brain

Making sense from sounds around us is fundamental to how we live and who we are. The hearing brain coordinates information from our ears and auditory nerves with all our other senses, muscles, and networks that mediate thought, emotions, and motivation. Hearing is important for language and music, as well as for an awareness of where we are and how our bodies move. Recent research on the auditory system provides a fascinating window into how our brains work. We will examine our day-to-day experiences with sound as well as strategies and technologies to preserve and improve our hearing as we age.

Affordable Housing: The Problem and Some Solutions Larry Koff (larry.koff@outlook.com)

We are all a part of the housing crisis. As citizens, we have allowed our elected and appointed officials, through zoning, municipal, state, and federal legislation, to limit our ability to provide the mix of housing at an affordable price and at the right locations. Issues of equity, segregation, and racism have undermined, to our detriment, the opportunity to address the affordable housing crisis. We as seniors and our extended families are increasingly impacted. In class, the focus throughout will be to understand the basics of affordable/mixed income housing today and the barriers and various strategies which we can adopt to address the housing crisis to the benefit of all.

Reading: The material will include various readings such as the affordable housing plans of Boston and neighboring communities, readings, short videos, and a review of some of the current mixed-use and affordable housing developments in Brookline and Newton. The class will involve discussion and the participation of speakers involved with these issues.

Beginning 40,000 years ago and continuing for another 20,000 years, our most ancient ancestors painted and carved art of remarkable sophistication and skill. Most of this art has been found in caves in northern Spain and southern France. We will survey these images to try to arrive at theories of how and

Queer History 101: Pre-Stonewall to the Present

Marvin Kabakoff (mkabakoff4@comcast.net) and Priscilla Golding (pagold1950@gmail.com)

The class will focus on various aspects of local, national, and some international LGBTQ+ history. In class, we will be reading early documentation of queer history, from Magnus Hirschfeld in the 1920s, through the Daughters of Bilitis and Mattachine Society to Stonewall, and the post-Stonewall movement, with its variety of organizations and activities. Among the topics covered will be the Jewish LGBTQ movement, AIDS, Gay Foster Parenting, queer archives, ongoing challenges, and how the queer movement intersects with other liberation movements. The class format will be lecture, videos, and discussion. Reading will be minimal and distributed online.

The Vision of August Wilson

Judy Herman (judithherman@thehermans.org)

August Wilson's plays have been the most widely- acclaimed and frequently performed in the history of American theater. In a decade-by-decade sequence of ten plays, Wilson presented a vision of Black life as it was lived in twentieth-century America. Wilson said he wanted to show "that Black lives were affected by the same things that matter to white people—love, honor, beauty, betrayal, duty." The situations of the plays do indeed show the characters struggling toward "things that matter"—work, love, respect. But more. The language of the dialogues gives the characters a kind of eloquence and dignity. "He allowed us to talk," one Black actor said.

In this study group, we will listen to how his characters talk in *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, Fences*, and *The Piano Lesson*. While we are of course considering the central conflicts of the plays, we will also be giving attention to the dramatic language that made critics call Wilson "the poet of the theater."

Preparation: Viewing videos of scenes and reading scripts will take about 1 % hours per week.

Reading: Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, Fences, and The Piano Lesson are each available, online, for under \$10 new and \$5 used. Copies of the plays are widely available in libraries.

Photographs can influence our views about social, political, and economic issues. In this course, we'll explore the elements that make a photograph powerful and examine how photographers create images that convey their views. We'll observe photographs in a PowerPoint format and discuss them from three perspectives: the photographer, the subject of the image, and the viewer. Selected articles will require 30-60 minutes of preparation each week.

Who Are We Now? In a discussion format, we will explore the conventional and not-so-conventional issues and mysteries that relate to the later stages of life. We will examine the

stereotypes about aging and the way we are perceived. Nurturing a new consciousness about the later stage of life, we will examine concepts relating to identity, culture, learning, community, and mortality. The book we will be using represents twenty-seven writers reflecting on their lives. These life stories may nurture interest in your own writing. Writing is welcome but is voluntary. Approximately one to two hours of preparation per week is expected.

Study Group Leaders



Roberta Apfel (Writing from the Heart) practiced psychiatry and psychoanalysis and was on the faculty at Harvard Medical School. She is also a life-long writer. She knows the value of writing, especially when done freely, spontaneously and by hand, and has found that writing in a safe, confidential (non-therapy, non-judgmental) workshop is a good way to remember and memorialize feelings and experiences.



Ronald (Ron) Ebert (*The First Artists*) is a retired Forensic Psychologist and long-term TI member who was captivated by cave art after visiting the Cave of Lascaux in his early 20s. Fifty years later he is trying to convert others.



Serena Fujita (The Ordeal of Japanese Americans during World War II) is a Reform Rabbi, ordained at Hebrew Union College. She was chaplain at Bucknell University for twenty years. She writes: "My ex-husband's family was removed from the San Francisco Bay area to one of the Internment Camps. I became interested in the subject after hearing stories from the members of the Fujita family and began doing extensive reading. I was an American history major in college, and yet never heard about the camps until one of my professors made an offhand comment about them."



Priscilla Golding (Queer History 101: Pre-Stonewall to the Present) was active in the Jewish GLBT community from the 1970s till 2000 as well as in the GLBT Labor union movement. She holds an MA in American History.



Marvin Kabakoff (Queer History 101: Pre-Stonewall to the Present) has been involved with the queer movement since the late 1960s and currently serves on the board of the History Project, Boston's LGBTQ+ archives. He has history degrees from Brandeis and Washington University-St. Louis. He worked for the National Archives for 37 years.

Study Group Leaders



Judy Herman (*The Vision of August Wilson*) has a doctorate in English and American literature and has taught in universities in the United States and France. Her poems have been published widely. She has taught 3 study groups for TILLI, with a focus on poetry.



Barbara Smith Koff, PhD (*The Hearing Brain*), an Emeritus Professor of Biochemistry at Boston University School of Medicine, taught medical and graduate students molecular biology. She led research grants on collagen gene regulation in wound healing, tumors and fibrosis using DNA cloning, molecular biology, cell biology, and transgenic mice.



Larry Koff (*The Housing Crisis*) was a community development organizer serving in the Peace Corps in the Niger Republic. He is now a retired city planner with 25 years experience at the Boston Redevelopment Authority and 20 years managing his own consulting practice providing planning services in housing, environment, transportation, economic development to communities mostly in Massachusetts. He has taught courses in TILLI on Regional Planning, Housing Options for Seniors, and Transportation Choices.






Modigliani Up Close: At the Barnes Collection Philadelphia, PA January 5 at 11:00 a.m.

20-year involvement of the US government in the Vietnam
War. The Post and The New York Times jointly appear before
the Supreme Court to plead their First Amendment rights.

This program was held at the New York Public Library on September 21, 2022 in recognition of banned book week. A panel of authors, scholars, and critics speak with MSNBC's Ali Velshi to reflect on the current climate around book bans and to situate our moment within the history of censorship in the US. Censorship and book bans are nothing new in American

life. Today books that highlight race, gender, or sexuality are being yanked from public shelves around the country. According to the American Library Association, the number of banned and challenged books doubled from 2020 to 2021 reaching the highest number they've ever counted.

employees, executives, and other professionals from top tech companies like Google, Facebook, and Twitter. These interviews are presented alongside scripted dramatizations of a teenager's social media addiction. These dramatizations draw attention to the rising concern of the radicalization of youth on the internet.
