## **Morning Study Groups**

#### Post Impressionism and a Series of Revolutionary Art Explosions: The Origins of Modern Art

In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, a series of radical art revolutions were underway in the French art world. Some of the most influential artworks of the period appeared in close succession. There was no longer any single school. The boundaries of what art was were "Saw art I hadn't seen before, loved learning the correlation of bible stories to the art, loved the discussion of what we were seeing and how the artists were inspired." — TILLI Participant

#### American History Through the Lens of the 1619 Project

So, you think that you know American history? How many times have you studied it? Chances are that one key determinant was mostly omitted. As Pulitzer Prize-winning historian, David W. Blight writes in *Race and Reunion: The Civil War in American Memory*, our nation's "glorious remembrance"

#### Animal Intelligence

'The difference in mind between man and the higher animals, great as it is, certainly is one of degree and not of kind'. Darwin, 1871. Science ignored Darwin's challenging — and revolutionary — insight for over a century, until researchers recently uncovered the cognitive capabilities of animals: from ants to elephants, octopuses to whales, and pigeons to parrots. In the past 25 years, research has uncovered unexpected animal cognition in areas such as linguistics, logical reasoning, tool creation and use, concept formation, empathy, and even political manipulation. No longer are animals thought to be passive creatures. They are now understood as complicated and complex beings in their own right. And we have reluctantly discovered we are not the only smart species. Lecture, videos and discussion. Two hours preparation.

#### Pride and Prejudice, Then and Now

*Pride & Prejudice* the year before.) Some read the book; others watched the films and TV series that have adapted, reworked, and altered the brilliant original. How genuine is an adaptation? What else changes when a plot is revised or a role transformed? We'll read the novel, watch three of the many videos, and consider the impact of the changes made by the many hands that have brought Austen's work to the screen. This is a discussion course. We won't disturb the magic. Weekly preparation will include reading about 40 pages and watching segments of each of the filmed versions.

**Readings:** Jane Austen, *Pride and Prejudice*, any edition of 61 chapters. Three videos of *Pride and Prejudice* which are available to rent or buy on Amazon for a modest fee: 1940 film (Laurence Olivier & Greer Garson); 1980 BBC TV series (Elizabeth Garvey and David Rintoul); 1995 BBC TV series (Colin Firth and Jennifer Ehle).

#### Come Together: Explore the Music of the Beatles

More than five decades after their break-up, the Beatles remain an object of fascination around the world and a prime object of sustained creative synergy. They were the biggest global pop-cultural phenomenon of the 1960s, with an impact that endures to this day and doubtless for decades to come. Although this course will touch on the Fab Four's influence on culture and other musicians, its focus will be on the band's music, from the earliest recordings through "Abbey Road." The format will be partly lecture accompanied by brief illustrative samplings of music and videos and partly class discussion. There will not be a session on April 24, and we will have a makeup class on May 15.

## Afternoon Study Groups

#### Telling Boston's Stories with Boston's Buildings

The urban, cultural, and social history of Boston can be told by looking at the city's buildings. A building's architecture can lead us to the stories of the people who constructed it and the cultural and historical influences that inspired its appearance. Looking at changes in a building over time and changes to its neighborhood, we can learn stories of the city. In class, we'll look at specific examples and hear some of Boston's stories as told by some of its significant buildings. The course will be conducted through looking at buildings and short readings provided by the instructor.

**Preparation:** It is not required, but you may be interested in purchasing *Boston's Oldest Buildings and Where to Find Them* by Joseph Bagley, \$21.73 on Amazon. Links to materials (readings and videos) will be shared on Google Classroom.

#### Weimar Germany

The course will begin with an overview of Weimar Germany, examining the political and economic events of the fifteen year period. Then we'll explore the accomplishments of the period in art, literature, theater, film, music, and sexuality, all set against the background of the growth of Nazism. We will conclude with the Nazi takeover of Germany. The format will be a mixture of lecture, discussion, film, and music. There will be articles distributed for class members to read, and some assignments to watch or listen to movies or music. Preparation time will be about one to two hours per week.

**Preparation:** Lists of readings, films, and websites will be shared on Google Classroom.

#### The Science of Longevity and Healthy Aging

Why do we experience physical degeneration as we age? Can we live healthier, longer lives? Can slowing the aging process help alleviate frailty and declines in cognitive function? Much has been learned about how longevity is controlled genetically and biochemically. We will examine the secrets of centenarians' long lifespans. By studying genetically manipulated animals, scientists have recently discovered longevity pathways that may lead to possible targets for slowing aging or clinical treatment. We will read selected chapters in the book How We Age by Coleen T. Murphy and supplemental articles. The study group will be lectures followed by discussion.

#### A Light in the Piazza: From the Novella to Broadway Musical

## **Study Group Leaders**



Helene Bailen (Post Impressionism and a Series of Revolutionary Art Explosions: The Origins of Modern Art) was a former French teacher. She was also a Gallery Instructor at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston for 45 years. Although she lectured in all the major collections, French Painting is her passion and lifelong interest.



Saralynn Busch (A Light in the Piazza: From the Novella to Broadway Musical) is a longtime community volunteer and avid participant in adult education programs. She previously led a TILLI study group on the experience of Jews in the American South. A lover of literature, film, and theater, working on this study group has given her the opportunity to dig deeper into the artistic evolution of one work of literature.



**Dayl Cohen** *(Telling Boston's Stories with Boston's Buildings)* is a retired architectural historian and was a volunteer tour guide for Boston by Foot. She still assists them, supervising writing of new tours and training new guides in using architecture to tell Boston's stories.



Susan Ebert (Jane Austen) often rereads Pride and Prejudice and marvels at Austen's insight and wit, even as she ponders the truths of the text. She holds a PhD in Comparative Literature and has led several previous courses at TILLI.



**Ron Ebert (Animal Intelligence)** is a retired forensic psychologist who trained pigeons and parrots as a graduate student, using operant conditioning, a system of reward and punishment. This course is my apology to all those birds who were so much smarter than I thought.



Serena Fujita (American History Through the Lens of the 1619 Project) majored in American History and has continued her interest in studying what contemporary historians are focusing on. She has taught a TILLI class on the Japanese Internment camps, another sad moment in American history.

# **Study Group Leaders**



**Ted Greenwood** (American History Through the Lens of the **1619** Project) has a deep interest in American history and contemporary American politics and leads study groups at TILLI on topics about which he wants to learn more.



Marvin Kabakoff (Weimar Germany) is a historian by education and an archivist by trade. He received his BA in history from Brandeis and his Ph.D. in European history from Washington University, St. Louis, and then worked for the National Archives for over 37 years. At different periods, he has also taught history and archival appraisal as an adjunct professor.



**Barbara Koff (The Science of Healthy Longevity and Aging)** taught medical and graduate students molecular biology and led research on collagen gene regulation. She enjoys teaching science courses to laypeople at TILLI.



Paul Lewis (Come Together: Exploring the Music of the

**Beatles)** earned a B.A. in history and an MBA in finance from Rice University, followed by a nearly 40-year career in financial services. None of these qualify him to lead a course on music. What may qualify him is a great deal of enthusiasm for certain composers and musicians, emphatically including the Beatles, and extensive research on the group. In addition, he has been a member of local classical choruses (Brookline, CoroAllegro, Back Bay Chorale) for many years, and has picked up some music theory along the way.



Deb Mandel (A Light in the Piazza: From the Novella to Broadway Musical) worked as a librarian for more than 40 years, most recently at Northeastern University, where she directed media services and served as liaison to Jewish studies, music, and media departments. She enjoys all types of music and cultural pursuits.

What is jazz and where did it come from? Why is the piano central to the history of jazz and how did its role change in the first half of the 20th century? Jazz journalist Allen Morrison answers these questions and more as he recounts the



great players and jazz piano styles, illustrating with fascinating film clips and rare audio recordings. The pioneering artists featured include Jelly Roll

Morton, James P. Johnson, Fats Waller, Art Tatum, Teddy Wilson, and Nat King Cole. Allen Morrison is a music journalist, jazz pianist, songwriter and lecturer on jazz history. A contributing writer for *DownBeat Magazine*, he has also written about jazz for *The Guardian, JazzTimes, TIDAL Magazine* and *Jazziz*.

The "Jews for Blues" program celebrates the profound impact that Jewish musicians, producers, and industry figures have had on the blues genre. By exploring the contributions of key figures such as Milt Gabler and Jerry Wexler, we aim to highlight how these

individuals helped promote and elevate blues music, bridging cultural divides and fostering collaboration. This initiative not only honors the rich history of Jewish involvement in the blues but also emphasizes the significance of shared musical traditions and the enduring legacy of these influential figures in shaping the sound and reach of the blues. We will also be playing music from the decades of the "Blues Masters" as part of our program.

"TISH - Shabbat Tablescapes" Mishkan Museum of Art, Ein Harod, Israel January 23, 2025, 11:00 a.m. (ONLINE)

Join us as we introduce you to the Mishkan Museum of Art, Ein Harod. Founded in 1937, the brainchild of Israeli artist and kibbutz member Haim Atar, the



Mishkan was established in the heart of the kibbutz community. Its founders believed that art, culture, knowledge, and understanding were essential. Today, the Mishkan is a respected museum and leading cultural center for local, national, and international artists. The museum houses a large collection of Jewish art from the late 19th and early 20th century and boasts an extensive collection of Judaica and Israeli art. Its structure has inspired some of the 20th century's most iconic buildings. In this virtual tour we will explore the Mishkan's current exhibit "TISH - Shabbat Tablescapes" with Judaica curator Dvora Liss and discover its relevance to the challenging times we are living in. We will also be joined by senior educator Tanya Fredman, who will take us behind the scenes in the educational and communal programs for all ages which provide resilience and hope to Israeli Society.

#### Laura Young, Prima Ballerina February 13, 2025, 11:00 a.m. (ONSITE at Temple Israel and ONLINE)



As a charter member of Boston Ballet and its predecessor New England Civic Ballet, Laura Young was one of the longest-serving female principal dancers at Boston Ballet. She started dancing with the Company in 1960 and retired from the stage in 1989. She toured throughout Europe and Asia with Boston Ballet, and partnered with ballet luminaries like Rudolf Nureyev and Fernando Bujones. While still

dancing, and for the next 30 years, Young served in many capacities for both the Company and the School, in her favorite role as a teacher. She retired after nearly six decades with Boston Ballet in 2019.
